The Agricultural and Labor Program, Inc. (ALPI), headquartered in Winter Haven, Florida, is an IRS certified 501(c)(3) private, nonprofit organization. The Agricultural and Labor Program is a direct descendent of The Agricultural and Labor Project, established in 1968 by the Coca-Cola Company to improve the quality of life for farm workers in their Florida citrus operations. Today, ALPI serves the total spectrum of socially and economically disadvantaged children and families throughout Florida.

In the early 70's, the organization made available child care services to the children of migrant and seasonal workers when no other service providers were available to meet the child care needs of these families. Since the late 70's, ALPI has continued to operate as the Central Agency for Subsidized Child Care Services that provides child care for as many as 6,000 children per year!

Over the years, a vast network has been established by ALPI. This network is comprised of agencies, churches, organizations and private groups and/or individuals whereby some provide direct financial assistance, others distribute applications for services. Partnerships and collaborative efforts between ALPI and the communities we serve are crucial to the success of service delivery.

In the years since its inception, The Agricultural and Labor Program, Inc. has continued to grow and to expand efforts to assist those persons that the organization was chartered to serve. This effort is continuous and will exist as long as there are persons needing services.

During the 2004-2005 program year The Agricultural and Labor Program continued its quest to provide a "constant flow of community, children, and family support services" in the midst of continuous funding cuts and threat of funding cuts on local, state, and federal levels.

The ALPI Management Team, including our Board of Directors, Advisory and Head Start Policy Council members and especially the ALPI Department Directors and their staff, banded together to ensure that we continue to do "whatever its takes" to meet the needs of our clients.

We continued exploring new funding opportunities and new partnerships, both of which have enabled us to expand services and maintain our service delivery efforts in target areas with the greatest of need. I am pleased to report that ALPI has received a \$500,000 JOLI Grant via the Office of Community Services (OCS) to provide technical and financial assistance to assist a newly formed enterprise in creating employment and business opportunities for individuals receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) and other low-income individuals beginning October 1, 2005 thru September 30, 2008.

Also on the horizon is certification from the **Florida Board of Nursing** and approval from the **Florida Commission of Independent Education** to establish and operate a technical training school in Volusia County. The school has been named "ALPI Technical Education Center". The center is scheduled to open in January 2006.

My sincere "thanks" to all our Community Partners and Funding Sources and to the ALPI Management Team for a job well done.

# Community Leadership and Service

ver 270 corporate, board members and guests attended this year's 37th annual event. The Annual Corporate Meeting and Luncheon is the single largest event ALPI holds each year and is usually held at maximum or near-maximum capacity.



This year's special guest speaker was Derrick Len Span (pictured left), former National President of the Community Action Partnership. While at the Community Action Partnership Mr. Span provided leadership and guidance for the Partnership's network of 1,000 Community Action Agencies (CAAs). At the Partnership, the nation's most extensive and effective anti-poverty organization, he oversaw several advocacy initiatives, including Dialogues on Poverty, Policy Forums, and Annual Conferences. Mr. Span also developed national program concepts, fund-raisers, and recommended policy changes, while working to implement strategic plans on key poverty-related issues, such as a

branding campaign aimed at raising national awareness of Community Action. He also traveled extensively on annual national tours visiting regions and keeping the network energized, and informed, and united toward the goal of eradicating poverty.

Mr. Span delivered an amazing speech to those gathered. He discussed the state of education for children in our country and how the blame should not be placed on the children for not learning, but rather on the system that does not deliver to our children. Poverty was also discussed at length by Mr. Span. In his fiery delivery he noted the following:

"Poverty is an epidemic in this country. Let us rise up, let us come together to see that working in this organization should be more than just getting a paycheck. You should begin to take your job seriously or stay on the sidelines. It is not enough to talk about a war on poverty, we must do something. Everywhere people talk about poverty, but we never get around to doing something about it. We must all move to action and do something about it! We should partner Chairperson), Derrick Len Span, and

# Regional Advisory Councils

#### **SOUTHERN REGION**

The Southern Region Advisory Council began over thirty-eight (38) years ago as a vehicle for the Minute Maid Company to: explore the needs of the community, channel resources to meet those needs, help survey the needs of the people, and form a sense of community among its members and constituents. The Southern Region Advisory Council remains a significant force in Eastern Polk County and parts of Highlands County, with members in Avon Park, Lake Wales, Bartow, and Frostproof. The Southern Region Advisory Council has conducted the following activities this past year in pursuit of ALPI's mission: Participated at the ALPI 2005 Annual Corporate Meeting; Participated at the ALPI 2005 Annual Family Picnic; Coordinated and served breakfast (60) and lunch (90) to the youth in Frostproof via the Polk County



School Board's Summer Feeding Program; and, continued community support relationships with local agencies: Cargill, United Way, Polk County School Board, Polk County Board of County Commissioners, and Youth & Family Alternatives, Inc. The Annual Meeting was held on October 21, 2005 with Pastor Alvin Conner serving as Keynote Speaker urging more "Unity in the Community" through community involvement. Officers were elected as follows: Lester Roberts(Chairperson), Katie Clarke (Vice Chairperson), Annie Robinson (Secretary), and Terry Wellington (Treasurer).

#### **NORTHERN REGION**



The Council decided that the FOCUS for 2005 would be COM-MUNITY FORUMS. The forums were strategically held in areas of member representation: Winter Garden and Sanford. The purpose of the Community Forums was to impart information to community residents regarding available resources. A Resource Panel was set up in each forum, and the resources and information provided were in over 20 areas, including: Job Training and Placement, Drug Free Living, School Programs, Farm Worker Services, Senior Services, Health, Consumer Credit Counseling, Housing, Legal Services, Head Start, etc. Northern Region Programs and Activities stem around numerous partner-


ships, including The Department of Children and Families who have donated computers for "ACCESS", an online program that allows residents to apply for Food Stamps and Medicaid. Scholarship Guidelines have been established for the 2006 program year that will be available for students who are chosen according to need. Money will be raised for this purpose. Officers were elected as follows: Grace Miller (Chairperson) - (also appointed to the ALPI Board of Directors), Charlie Mae Wilder (Vice Chairperson), Constance Anderson (Secretary), Marva Hawkins (Treasurer), and Willie Williams (Parliamentarian).

# Regional Advisory Councils

#### **CENTRAL REGION**

The Council had eighteen members and two tasks ahead of it this past year. One was to plan and host the Agency-wide Annual Picnic and Reunion. The other task was to plan the community-wide Central Region Annual Meeting function. In addition, the Council performed extensive volunteer work in the community. This year that included individual participation and group activities.

Among these activities were planning and conducting activities for children at the Annual Picnic, which involved writing contests, poetry contests, sports competitions, and award presentations for over 100 children aged 3 - 17. Over 300 persons were also hosted at the annual reunion and picnic. This was a very large undertaking, but all the members of the Council worked very hard to make it a great success! This year the theme for the Central Region's Annual Meeting was Impacting Our Children's Education. Our special guest at the Annual Meeting was Dr. Gail McKinzie, Superintendent of Polk County Schools. The event was very well attended by the Polk County Community and was advertised in the local media, including radio stations in the Polk County area. Officers were elected as follows: Johnnie McNair (Chairperson), Viola Le'One' (Vice Chairperson), Ruby Willix (Secretary), Jacqueline Rentz (Assistant Secretary), Julia Miller (Treasurer) and Clarence Grier (Parliamentarian).



#### **EASTERN REGION**

The Eastern Region Advisory Council continued to make a difference in the community this past year. The goal was to involve children and families in community activities. Some council members participated in Child Care and Head Start/ Early Head Start center activities along-side participating parents. The participation included the Head Start/Early Head Start Self Assessment. The



Council held its 2005 Annual Meeting on October 15, 2005. The theme for the Annual Meeting was "Back to Basics - A Call for Education." The Advisory Council accomplished its goal of community and family involvement in council activities. 150 plus parents and community individuals from the St. Lucie County community attended the meeting, as well as ALPI Head Start/Early Head Start and Child Care parents and children. The keynote Speaker was Minister Denny Hart of the First Missionary Baptist Church, in Vero Beach, Florida. His remarks supported the Council's theme for the annual meeting. The following members were re-elected to the council: Fannie Moore, Constance Griffin, William Holt and Francis Cooper.

# PROGRAM SERVICE DELIVERY ACTIVITIES AND POSITIVE OUTCOMES

During this past fiscal year, ALPI program service delivery activities registered positive outcomes for eligible children, families and farm workers. Today the ALPI Mission continues to be as significant and relevant as it was 36 years ago.

#### **Employment Opportunities**

Significant gains in ALPI Human Resources realized employment opportunities for 166 employees ranging from trainee to professional management positions.

#### **Funding Resources**

During this past fiscal year, ALPI management secured over 17 million dollars in local, state and federal funding to provide first and foremost, services for eligible children and families, jobs, and financial support to the local economy via contracts with local vendors and banking institutions.

#### **Programs and Services**

Programs and services provided via ALPI programs have realized the following positive service delivery outcomes during the 2004-2005 program year.



#### **COMMUNITY SERVICES**

Programs Include: Emergency Services to Farmworkers, Employment and Training Services, Hurricane Services to Farmworkers, Clothing and Household Items through Goodwill Industries, LIHEAP Services for Energy, HUD Housing Counseling, and JOLI (a program with a focus on training low-income individuals in landscaping skills).

The ALPI Community Service Division provided direct services to 18,183 households and indirect services and referrals to 36,366

households. Some of these services were provided statewide and in targeted counties, including Hendry, Palm Beach, Collier, Volusia, Polk, Indian River, Martin, St. Lucie, Putnam and Glades.

ATEC (ALPI Technical Education Center) was officially formed in Volusia County, after receiving a provisional from the Florida Commission on Independent Education. The ALPI Technical Education Center's philosophy is that all individuals should have an opportunity made available to them for developing and reaching their Career Educational Goals. The school's objective is to provide a State approved program to assist individuals in becoming certified and eligible for employment in the healthcare field as Nurse Assistants.

#### **HEAD START/EARLY HEAD START**

ALPI Head Start provided a range of individualized services in the areas of education, early childhood development, medical, dental, mental health, nutrition and parent involvement to 762 children and their families during the 2004-2005 program year.

Other noteworthy services included:



- Speed DIAL screening administered to 762 children
- Vision screening completed on 762 children
- Hearing screening completed on 762 children
- Dental screening completed on 762 children
- Dental follow-up completed on 212 children
- Height and weight completed on 762 children
- Hemoglobin/hematocrit completed on 762 children
- Nutritional counseling provided to 181 parents
- 90% of enrolled families had access to an ongoing source of continuous health care; staff assisted the additional families with securing a medical home
- Individualized Health Care Plans addressing needs such as asthma, heart condition and seizure were developed for 41 children
- Mental Health observations conducted twice in 38 classrooms; 8 children referred for services
- Disability services provided to 72 children. Individual Education Plans (IEP) were completed on these children



62 Head Start children participated in a random Pre and Post Test with the Test of Oral Language Development - 3 (TOLD-3) and the Test of Early Reading Ability - 3 (TERA-3) with Literacy Launchers, Inc., Pilot Study in 2005. These children received eight weeks of instruction through Headsprout Reading Basics and through Millie's Math House. This pilot program made a significant and noticeable difference in these children. The average gains were:

During the 2004-2005 school year, the Family and Community Partnerships Services area was busy with many different programs, among them the Community Resource Fair, Youth Mentoring Program and the Nurturing Fatherhood Program:

Fifteen different vendors participated in the Community Resource Fair, which took place in May of 2005. The St. Lucie County Health Department provided free blood pressure tests, stress tests, and HIV tests. Parents had the opportunity to go aboard the Literacy Launchers bus, which was equipped with over 18 computers. Visitors to the bus were able to view the different programs the Head Start children participated in. Parents and

community visitors had the opportunity to visit each vendor booth to get information on their organiza-

tion. Bank of America was also present and assisted several families with opening checking accounts and qualifying for loans.

Through a continued collaboration between ALPI and the Eckerd Youth Alternative Program, the ALPI Young Mentoring Program provided much needed assistance and resources to potentially troubled youth. Many of the teens (all from low-income families) in the program went to ALPI Head Start centers to read books to the children and even personally mentored some of the Head Start children. The teens in the ALPI Young Mentoring Program helped to empower the Head Start



children to help themselves and at the same time promoted literacy.

The establishment of the Nurturing Fatherhood Program last year continues to enhance the effectiveness of ALPI's Community Partnerships. The ALPI Nurturing Fatherhood Program had a very successful and active second year. With events such as the Nurturing Fatherhood Reading Day and the Valentines Day Ball, fathers were more active than ever in their children's education. The program provides ALPI fathers the opportunity to be more actively involved with their Head Start/Early Head Start children.

A total of 762 Head Start families received assistance during the 2004-2005 program year. The following positive outcomes were realized.

#### **COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS**

ALPI continued to maintain and established very meaningful partnerships with both public and private service providers and organizations. We continued partnerships with public and private organizations to ensure a constant flow of service delivery activities that are affordable and accessible.

Community Services were provided via an established volunteer network made up of over 35 partners of diverse community agencies state-wide. There are 8 sites in a 5 county area that assisted directly with the ALPI's LIHEAP energy programs. Further, as a result of the 2004 hurricanes and in an effort to pro-



vide critically needed emergency services to farmworkers, ALPI joined forces with over 35 community partners in a 10 county area.

The ALPI Head Start children were served in eight directly operated sites located in community facilities, school board and housing authority property. Five additional contracted sites are housed in private child care provider centers.

#### AGENCY TECHNOLOGY ENHANCEMENTS

Major changes have taken place in ALPI's IT Department, including the complete re-engineering of the ALPI WAN (wide-area-network). A total of five servers, housed in ALPI's Winter Haven Administration Office, provide all the power needed to run ALPI's network. The state-of-the-art servers contain high speed memory and optimized hard drives, helping to insure efficiency and maximum productivity. Additionally, three (3) 2200VA battery backup units installed have the ability to temporarily continue to run the servers and ultimately, to initiate an unsupervised network shutdown in the event of an extended power failure.

Terminals have replaced personal computers at all ALPI locations outside of Winter Haven, Florida. By using terminals, all software updates, maintenance, trouble-shooting, and even "live" one-on-one training can be conducted from the ALPI IT hub in Winter Haven, Florida, without technicians having to travel to any remote facility. If a terminal should ever go bad, a replacement can simply be shipped overnight to the facility and plugged in for *immediate use*.





Communications have been vastly improved by eliminating frame-relays and switching over to broadband. After considering both DSL and cable, it was determined that cable would be the fastest of the two, with cost differences being insignificant. A Cisco PIX Firewall/VPN was installed at each remote location, along with a managed fast speed Ethernet switch to obtain optimal network speed. The Winter Haven Administration Office was set up with two Roadrunner lines, one to serve the traffic from remote locations and one line dedicated to

fast speed internet for it's resident users.

In addition to all the above, thorough inventories were performed, existing equipment was upgraded (if required), damaged or inadequate cabling was replaced, and consistency was developed across the entire Agency's network.

#### STAFF TRAINING AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Once again this year, ALPI's Head Start and Early Head Start Programs realized very significant gains in Staff Professional Development. Teachers and Lead Caregivers within both Head Start and Early Head Start accomplished the following:

#### **Head Start**

- A total of 50% of all teachers possess AS Degrees
- A total of 25% of all teachers possess an advanced degree
- Two staff persons are working toward Baccalaureate Degrees
- One staff person is working toward a Master's Degree

#### **Early Head Start**

- A total of 80% of all teachers possess AS Degrees
- A total of 20% of all teachers possess an advanced degree
- One staff person is working toward an Associates Degree
- One staff person is working toward a Baccalaureate Degree
- One staff person is working toward a Master's Degree

#### **Early Head Start Caregivers Assistants**


- A total of 20% of all Caregivers Assistants possess a Child Development Associate (CDA) credential.


