ALPI strongly believes that when people take accountability, they are more likely to invest their hearts and minds in getting things done, allowing the organization to achieve results that often exceed expectations.

Summer Feeding and Work Experience Program

Community Action Partnership

This year the ALPI Child Development and Family Services Division and ALPI Community Services and Economic Development Division came together, in partnership with the Polk County School Board, to provide services to the community of Frostproof, Florida through a Summer Feeding and



Work Experience Program. The program was located at the ALPI owned Lakeview Community Center and ran from June 13 to August 3, 2012, providing breakfast and lunch to children in the community. Through this much anticipated community program, over 75 children were provided nutritious meals. Head Start/Early Head Start staff supervised and coordinated fun and educational activities in between meals and throughout the day. Activities included sports, arts and crafts, and presentations from community providers.



Through the Summer Feeding and Work Experience Program ALPI was able to employ youths to assist with feeding the children and activities at the center. The youths were given the opportunity to develop skills in mentorship of children and coordination of activities.

This program was especially significant because of the financial challenges many families are being faced with and the assistance that they so desperately need. The program provided summer activities in a safe environment, nutritious meals, and employment for young people who may not otherwise have had an income over the summer. Through this exceptional program, ALPI was able to touch the lives of many individual children, teenagers, and their families.

ALPI'S Comprehensive Educational Approach

Working in small groups is a key element in classrooms. The teaching team (Teacher/Teacher Assistant) works with a small group of children or one-on-one on a specific domain area. The Head Start children, 3 to 5 years old, are expected to progress



in all the areas of child development and early learning, as outlined by the Head Start Child Development and Early Learning Framework. Each domain includes **Domain Elements** that are more

specifically defined by its components. For example, the domain of Science Knowledge and Skills is composed of two domain

elements: Scientific Skills and Method and Conceptual Knowledge of the Natural and Physical World. Teaching is intentional and focuses on how children learn. Investigation and exploration; purposeful, engaged play; and intentional, scaffolded instruction based on the developmental level



of each child are essential elements also used. Teaching staff conduct ongoing child assessments throughout the year to determine if instructional strategies need to be adapted to meet children's specific needs and changes are then made accordingly – helping to insure a true "custom fit" in the education of our children.



ALPI Technical Education Center (ATEC) 2012 Graduation

Established in 2004 and located in Deland, Florida, the ALPI Technical Education Center's philosophy is that all individuals should have an opportunity made available to them for developing and reaching their career educational goals. The school's objective is to provide a State approved program to assist individuals in becoming certified and eligible for employment in the healthcare field, including Home Health Aid and Phlebotomy. Additionally, through the Department of Education WIA-167 program, ATEC also provides vocational training courses to farm workers in Volusia County. This graduation class of 15 had 13 students find immediate employment (in their specific field of study) upon graduation – an incredible accomplishment in today's challenging economic environment. This summer was an exciting and busy one for ALPI staff. In preparation for the 2012-2013 school year, Management staff worked very hard and diligently in order to have all ALPI Head Start Centers ready to "Welcome" the returning and newly enrolled children. August 20, 2012 marked the first day of school. It was a successful start to the new school year, with an average attendance of 82%. Transportation services were also started on the first day of school in order

to assist those families who had expressed the need for transportation services. Right out of the gate, classroom staff began working with children on different areas of the Head Start Child Development and Early Learning Framework, in conjunction with the Creative Curriculum, VPK Standards, HMH Curriculum and Materials, etc. ALPI Centers are off to a great start and look forward to keeping that momentum growing throughout the school year.







ALPI LIHEAP/Community Services

Director Speaks at Neighborhood Service Center in Winter Haven, FL

Burnham, LIHEAP/ Cheryl Community Services Director, recently spoke at the Neighborhood Service Center in Winter Haven, where Mrs. Glenda Jones (ALPI Member) serves Board Executive Director. Information was distributed to seniors about LIHEAP Program. Neighborhood Service Center will now be serving (on an "as needed" basis) as an ALPI service delivery site for seniors in need of utility payment assistance, but



find it difficult or even impossible to travel outside of their neighborhood to apply for the critical assistance.

LIHEAP is a Federally funded block grant program

operating since 1982. Grantees, such as ALPI, serve low-income households who seek assistance for their home energy bills. Some forms of assistance available low income households through State LIHEAP programs include: financial assistance towards a household's energy bill, emergency assistance if a household's home energy service is shut off or about to be shut off, and a range of other energyrelated services that States may

choose to offer, such as weatherization improvements, utility equipment repair and replacement, budgeting counseling and so forth.

ALPI Staff Improves Knowledge and Skills

ALPI's Pre-Service Training took a different approach this year as they followed ALPI's approved 2012-2013 Training and Technical Assistance Plan for the Child Development and Family Services Division. Pre-Service Training and Staff Development was held from August 13 thru August 17, 2012 and included over 200 staff members from St. Lucie and Polk Counties, as well as ALPI contracted centers. The week-long event was specifically designed to improve staff knowledge and skills, as well as to better communicate services expectations and current federal and state regulations. ALPI was able to engage the best consultants in the fields of Early Childhood Development, Infants and Toddlers Growth and Development, Eligibility Recruitment and Selection of Children, Etc. Participants included: Mary Huffstetter, Ph.D., BCBA, Early Childhood Coordinator for School Board/HMH; Debbie Hillman, Early Childhood Consultant; Maria

Russell, Infants/Toddlers Consultant; Diana Josue, Transportation Consultant; Helga Snure, Health Department - Health Education Program Director; HS University, etc. Many topics were covered during the four day training, including:

Offered screenings included: vision, hearing, height/weight, blood pressure, developmental delay, dental, etc. In addition, families were referred to and/or provided information on the Healthy Start Program, WIC (for nutritional assessment) and KidCare (Medicaid enrollment).

The focus of the event was to partner with community resources providers in order to present a more effective and efficient delivery of services to our children and families entering the Head Start/Early Head Start program. The ALPI Health Fair gave our community partners a public forum and educated families regarding the many resources/ services available. The event also allowed for pre-screening of children through health, developmental, and behavioral screenings, including: height and weight, hearing and vision, dental, blood pressure, and speech and language.



The program was named "Camp Ready" since it was geared towards children going into kindergarten for the upcoming school year of 2012-2013. This program not only included all the children in ALPI's Polk County Head Start program that were transitioning to kindergarten, but also children in the community that attended local child care centers.

Camp Ready helped prepare the children for entrance into kindergarten and enhanced their skills with remedial activities to make the transition even more successful. The four week program ran from July 16 through August 10, 2012. Certified kindergarten teachers were utilized to instruct in the classrooms.

Parent engagement was encouraged through volunteering in the classroom, weekly family newsletters with activities for both children and parents, and a grand finale ceremony for children and families.
