WELLNESS PROGRAM IN THE WORKPLACE TO PROMOTE HEALTHY HABITS AND HEALTHY LIVING

According to the research findings in the RAND Health Workplace Wellness Programs Study Final **Report**, an epidemic of "lifestyle diseases" has developed in the United States: unhealthy lifestyles, such as inactivity, poor nutrition, tobacco use, and frequent alcohol consumption, are driving up the prevalence of

The Workplace Wellness Programs Study Final Report reminds us further that out of concern about the impact of chronic disease on employee health and well-being, the cost of health care coverage, and competitiveness, employers are adopting health promotion and disease prevention strategies, commonly referred to as workplace wellness programs. Disease prevention programs aim either to prevent the onset of diseases (primary prevention) or to diagnose and treat disease at an early stage before complications occur (secondary prevention). Workplace wellness takes advantage of employers' access to employees at an age when interventions can still change their long-term health trajectory. The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (Affordable Care Act) supports this trend with several provisions regarding health promotion and also mandated this study.

The Agricultural and Labor Program, Inc., Human Resources Department, has been given the charge to move forward with our Workplace Wellness Program. As we move forward with our Workplace Wellness Program efforts, I want to commend all the ALPI employees who stepped up to the plate and have pledged to do whatever it takes TO PROMOTE HEALTHY HABITS IN THE WORKPLACE AND HEALTHY LIVING.



He explained that anything is possible if you want it bad enough. The outcome of your efforts to improve is based on how hard you are willing

ALPI Parents Enroll in Program to Reduce the Impact of Poverty

s part of the Bridges to Prosperity efforts, the ALPI Head Start/Early Head Start Program (St. Lucie County) has had 25 Head Start/Early Head Start parents enroll in the "Getting Ahead in A Just Gettin' By World" program. This 19 week intensive training is designed to get parents to investigate the impact of poverty, how low wages is having an effect on them, and how to move their personal situation from a just getting-by world to a getting-ahead world. The course causes the participants to build a new future by setting SMART goals for their lives. Participants are connected with mentors to assist them along their journey to success. The parents receive training on how to compose a resume, interview skills, budgeting, money management, and many other life skills necessary to change their lives.

Getting Ahead provides people in poverty with the same information found in



the Bridges Out of Poverty training, which was developed for professionals and others in the community working to end poverty. The Getting Ahead curriculum consists of the following:

- Involves rigorous work done in a safe learning environment with the support of an experienced facilitator and co-facilitator.
- Enables participants, called "Investigators," to examine their own experience of poverty as well as explore issues in the community that impact poverty banking, housing, jobs, transportation providing critical information the community can use to take action to end poverty.
- Guides investigators through an assessment of their own resources and how to build those resources as part of their move to self-sufficiency.
- Puts the concepts, tools, and relationships in the hands of people in poverty
 to make a difference in their own
 lives and in the lives of others in their
 community.

The 2015 spring class was facilitated by ALPI staff member and certified trainer, Kevin Singletary. Two parents and one staff graduated from the class: Pamela Burson, Queen Townsend Head Start Center II, Vivian Tindall, Garden Terrace and staff member Regena Gilchrist. Congratulations to Pamela Burson, Vivian Tindall and Regena Gilchrist on their accomplishment.

SHAREKA LEWIS Major: Criminal Justice – Cum Laude

Shareka Lewis entered the Family Self-Sufficiency Program (FSSP) in November 2013. Before entering the program Shareka came to the agency seeking assistance to get a food card because she was denied food stamps. Shareka told her Case Manager, Sheila Armstead, that she was enrolled at Polk State College in the Criminal Justice Program and worked at the school part time. Shareka was interested in the ALPI Program and attended the orientation.

Although she had a steady GPA of at least 3.28, she struggled with Math. But, with support from her case manager, the services of a tudor were enlisted and she was able to overcome her struggle

Shareka Lewis completed the ALPI FSSP and graduated on Thursday, May 7, 2015 with a degree in Criminal Justice (Cum Laude). She was able to achieve two of the three goals she had established as part of the program: a Criminal Justice degree and purchasing a car. She is now well on her way to achieving the final goal – employment.



FREDDIE MORGAN Major: Nursing

Freddie Morgan entered the Family Self-Sufficiency Program (FSSP) in March 2012. Before entering the program, Freddie was laid off from his job as a CNA and was collecting unemployment. Freddie told his case manager, Sheila Armstead, that he had heard about the program from someone that went through it and how grateful they were to receive the assistance.

While going through the nursing program, the agency was able to assist Freddie with books, scrubs, shoes, occasional gas cards, etc.

Freddie graduated from Polk State College on Thursday, May 7,2015 and is currently waiting to obtain his State Board License. He hopes to work in the Intensive Care Unit of a hospital.

MICHEAL FORRESTER Major: Elementary Education



Micheal Forrester, a single female raising a son under the age of one, came into the ALPI Family-Self Sufficiency Program (FSSP) in August 2013. Micheal came seeking assistance for rent and began sharing her story with case manager, Sheila Armstead. She wanted to return to school in order to obtain an Elementary Education degree and open her own child care facility.

While in school, Micheal had a few setbacks, but with encouragement from her case manager and assistance from ALPI, she was able to overcome.

Micheal was awarded a degree in Elementary Education from Polk State College on Thursday, May 7, 2015. She is grateful to her case manager, Sheila Armstead, not only for encouraging her to return to school but for all the emotional support she provided. Micheal is "eternally grateful" to ALPI for all the assistance given to her and said she would be sharing information about the ALPI FSSP with others who really want to change their lives!
