Today, ALPI serves the total spectrum of socially and economically disadvantaged children and families throughout Florida.

In the early 70's, the organization made available child care services to the children of migrant and seasonal workers when no other service providers were available to meet the child care needs of these families. Since the late 70's, ALPI has continued to operate as the Central Agency for Subsidized Child Care Services that provides child care for as many as 6,000 children per year!

Over the years, a vast network has been established by ALPI. This network is comprised of agencies, churches, organizations and private groups and/or individuals whereby some provide direct financial assistance, others distribute applications for services. Partnerships and collaborative efforts between ALPI and the communities we serve are crucial to the success of service delivery.



The ALPI Board of Directors reviews its Strategic Plan annually to: 1. Provide a "road map" for the future direction of ALPI and 2. To assist in the development of strategies to accomplish the plan's identified goals (create additional educational experiences and opportunities for staff; devise a plan of upward mobility within the agency; partnerships with other entities for more efficient service delivery; target new areas of expansion; and enhance program development for and service delivery to children and their families). The ALPI management and staff, in conjunction with Board of Directors, continue to plan and implement activities that allow for the organization to progress towards accomplishing each goal. It is with great pride that we present this *snapshot* of the Agricultural and Labor Program, Incorporated's (ALPI) "Third Year Performance Summary" for its Five-Year Strategic Plan (2013-2018) for the period of July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016.

## GOVERNANCE & LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

**Exemplary Governance and** Leadership Development is driven by a strong and engaged Board of Directors. Dedication and many volunteer hours are the key to the realization of positive outcomes to ensure ongoing compliance with programmatic and regulatory mandates in a timely manner. Ongoing 2015-2016 Board Development and Management action items reviewed via its committee structure and the Board's approval process included the following positive outcomes.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE

- Approved request to secure adequate funding to fund ALPI's 2015-2016 agency wide budget of \$17,371,565, of which 93% was earmarked to address the needs of children and families facing social and economic challenges.
- Fully Funded 2015-2016 Operating Budgets.
- Maintained adequate funding to maintain compliance with the Affordable Health Care Act compliance/options.
- Reviewed financial reports with management to maintain a positive bottom line to ensure ongoing regulatory compliance and effective financial resource development management.
- Secured approval of agency's 2016 Indirect Cost Proposal and approved Indirect Cost Rate.
- Secured resources to provide: 1.3% cost of living increase for all eligible employees, 3.7% one-time professional incentive payments, and 4% retirement contributions for all eligible employees.
- Secured the engagement of an independent auditing firm to complete the annual audit for agency's general operating accounts for period ending 6/30/2016.

- Attended NCAF Legislative Conference in March 2016.
- Attended Legislative Day in Tallahassee, FL, including trip to Children's Day in Tallahassee.
- Facilitated voter registration drives in partnership with the Supervisor of Elections in each region at key ALPI energy fairs, with assistance form advisory council members.



#### MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

- Corporate applications were approved for: Eastern Council (7), Northern Region (3) and Central Region (59).
- Certified Head Start/Early Head Start Policy Council Membership Recruitment Plan.

#### PROGRAM PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Committee reviewed and recommended Board approval of the following action items, including authorizing the Chief Executive Officer to execute, on behalf of the Board of Directors, any agreements or documents that may be required:

- Ratify and/or approve of the 2016-2017 refunding and new funding applications.
- Review of internal and external monitoring reports to insure ongoing compliance with funding source regulations.

- Identify nominations for Volunteer Services Awards (Robert Bryant Jr. Award, FACA, FHSA, SEACAA, Region IV HS, NHSA). Review process for contacting individuals/ businesses receiving corporate/community awards.
- Annual meeting plan process and activities.
- Special events calendar.

#### **ADVOCACY & COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT PARTNERSHIPS**

Meaningful partnerships enhance community engagement in projects, increase community awareness of the issues being addressed and establish a framework for the continued support of services that support community advocacy efforts, including the creation and expansion of programs and services, developing partnerships, and changing public policies, laws, and practices to improve the lives of families seeking a hand up.

HEAD START/EHS POLICY COUNCIL: The Policy Council composition consists of 77% of parents whose children are currently enrolled in the Early Head Start Program and 23% of Community Social Services agencies. ADVISORY COUNCILS: Advisory Councils to the organization serve important functions, they are vital to the success of the organization. Councils: (1) are good will ambassadors (2) are knowledgeable about the missions of the organization (3) support the organization, and (4) are vital communication links to the communities that the organization serve. OTHER COMMUNITY PARTNERS & ADVOCACY GROUPS: Other Advocacy and Community Engagement Partnerships are important components of ALPI community partnership efforts.

#### Northern Regional Advisory Council

The council's volunteer hours in the community include working with youth inmates, volunteering in public schools, Federal government initiatives with the Office of Elections as poll workers and greeters, volunteering in hospitals and assisting with many other activities and events in the community. The total documented hours incurred in community work for the total membership is documented at 3,519. The first NRAC scholarship award for \$500 was presented to Faith Nathan.



#### Eastern Regional Advisory Council

The Eastern Regional Advisory Council hosted its annual meeting and Arie Lou Perkins Scholarship luncheon on October 15, 2016 at ALPI's Queen Townsend Training Center in Ft. Pierce, FL. The theme was "ALPI .... Paving The Way In Unity". \$500 scholarships were awarded to: Tyler Gather, Jane Clement and Nederia Davis. Each advisory member received a plaque for their volunteer service, including a Certificate of Appreciation for Mrs. Marjorie Gaskin.



#### Central Regional Advisory Council

CRAC participated in many agency sponsored activities and events, including ongoing voter registration activities, as well as LIHEAP energy fairs in both Bartow, FL and Winter Haven, FL. The annual corporate meeting was held on October 4, 2016. Keynote speaker was Shawn Kinsey of Winter Haven, FL. Each council member was presented with a Volunteer Service plaque for their untiring support and service during the program year. The council proudly presented its annual Arabell Wiggins Scholarship Award in the amount of \$500 to Rodvioson Alnord.



#### Southern Regional Advisory Council

Services were provided in the council's service areas of Frost-proof, Avon Park, Sebring, Lake Placid, Lake Wales, Fort Meade, Wauchula, Clewiston, LaBelle, Moore Haven, Naples and Immokalee. There were three major energy fair events held in the Southern Region Advisory Council's service areas, specifically the "B" Street Community Center in Lake Wales, the Boys and Girls Club in Sebring and the Lake View Park Community Center in Frostproof, FL. SRAC proudly announces the first recipients of the Seigler, Sims & Wade Scholarship: Destiny Smith and Ja'Quez Pugh. Each received \$500.00.



#### HEAD START POLICY COUNCIL

During the 2015-2016 program year the Parent Committees and Policy Council were established during the months of September and October 2015 at all the directly operated and contracted centers. The Parent Committees consists of parents of children enrolled in the Head Start and Early Head Start programs. The Council was provided with a Shared Governance Orientation/Training on October 1-2, 2015. The main focus of the training was exploration of the roles and responsibilities of ALPI's Board of Directors and the Policy Council. The Policy Council, in their decision-making role, was able to approve the following: Agency Personnel Policies

and Procedures, Agency Financial Management Policies and Procedures, Program Management Plan/Operational Policies and Procedures to include, but not limited to: Internal Dispute Resolution, Community Compliant and Self-Assessment Process, Funding Grant Applications, Human Resources Actions, Financial Reports, Program Progress Reports and School Readiness/Child Outcome Reports.

The council was made up of 77% parents and 23% community representatives.

#### THE ALPI TECHNICAL EDUCATION CENTER (ATEC)

The ALPI Technical Education Center (ATEC) is licensed by the Florida Commission for Independent Education (CIE) for the provision of occupational training in Volusia County. During 2015-2016, ATEC provided Home Health Aid and Certified Nursing Assistant Preparation classes to interested students. Below is a sampling of the many accomplishments achieved this past year:

- Partnership with Daytona State Literacy Council in order to offer GED and tutoring classes.
- Trained ten students in Home Health Aid throughout the year and 15 students for the CNA preparation classes.
- Eight students were employed in the medical field.

#### AGRICULTURAL AND LABOR HOUSING DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION (ALHDC)



The primary mission of the ALHDC is the provision of affordable rental housing to farmworkers in the Auburndale area of Polk County. In carrying out this mission, the ALHDC owns a 57-unit rental complex in Auburndale, FL. New Horizons apartment complex maintains an occupancy rate of 85% or above, with most months at 95% or better. During this reporting period, ALHDC has realized another annual audit with no findings, retaining its "low risk" auditee designation.

#### CHILD CARE FOOD and NUTRITION SERVICES

A total of 364,601 meals were provided to pre-school and school age children via the Child Care Food and Nutrition Program.

#### HUD HOUSING COUNSELING

Housing counseling or foreclosure mitigation was provided to 120 families in Polk county.

## LOW INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

LIHEAP served 2,638 low-income families and direct assistance payments were \$985,010.58.



#### PROGRAMS & FAMILY SUPPORT SERVICES OVERVIEW



ALPI Programs and Family Support Services offered during 2015-2016 services once again realized very positive outcomes, including the following:

#### EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Full-time and part-time employment opportunities were maintained to 225 employees in Highlands, Polk, St. Lucie, and Volusia counties.

#### CSBG - COMMUNITY SERVICES BLOCK GRANT

- The CSBG Family Self-Sufficiency (FSSP) Program enrolled 120 families, comprised of 298 individuals. 48 family members were unem ployed and obtained a job and 31 members obtained an increase in income or benefits. Additionally, 39 obtained marketable skills and training and 23 completed post-secondary education.
- Ten clients were enrolled into the Work Experience Program and were employed by several different employers.
- Emergency Home Energy Assistance Program (EHEAP) services were provided to 101 families, comprised of 164 individual members.

#### FARMWORKERS EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE

• A total of 611 units of service were provided to migrant and/or seasonal farmworkers. This included electric assistance, utility assistance and gas/food cards.

#### HEAD START/EARLY HEAD START and SCHOOL READINESS OPPORTUNITIES

- 897 families participated in the Head Start/Early Head Start program.
- 982 children were actively enrolled in the Head Start/Early Head Start program.
- Voluntary Pre-Kindergarten services were provided to 404 children and their families in St. Lucie county.

#### FAMILY SELF-SUFFICIENCY SUCCESS STORIES

#### Turning Tragedy Into Triumph



Tania G. Kocher is a single parent (raising a 13-year-old daughter) who enrolled in the Family Self-Sufficiency Program (FSSP) in October 2014. Ms. Kocher was seeking assistance from the agency to complete the Criminal Justice Program at Southeastern University in Lakeland (Polk County).

Ms. Kocher is an inspiring young lady changing her life for the better and becoming self-sufficient. At the age of 19 she started heading down the wrong path and began a series of run-ins with the law. From 1998 thru 2011, she had been arrested six times on over six charges and was ultimately classified a felon. By this time, she was addicted to heroin, methamphetamine, and alcohol.

While in jail in 2011, a staff member from Hope Now Women's Transition Center met with Ms. Kocher and discussed her life struggles. She then decided to turn her life around and entered the facility for eight months to break the cycle of addiction. Ms. Kocher went from a life of severe substance abuse and chronic incarceration to becoming a productive member of society. She went from no rent (homeless) to paying rent living at the Agency for Community Treatment Services (ACTS) Housing Program, from a bike rider to a car driver and continues to strive to improve her life through volunteering, working part time, and continuing on with her education.

Ms. Kocher has established goals for herself in life and wants to mentor individuals who are going through the same thing she did and also hopes to one day have a career as a social worker. She is now a counselor (volunteer) at Hope Now and is one of the featured stories on their website and agency brochure. Additionally, she is currently in the process of completing a documentary about her life story.

With assistance from ALPI's Family Self-Sufficiency Program, Ms. Kocher was able to receive assistance with tuition and other needs she encountered along the way. With help and encouragement from her Case Manager Sheila Armstead, Ms. Kocher continues to stay focused on all her goals.

#### Changing Lives Through Practical Case Management

Susan Henson was a single Head Start parent raising two boys, one of whom attends the ALPI Frostproof CDC. After deciding she needed to change the direction of her life, she enrolled in the ALPI Family Self-Sufficiency Program (FSSP) in order to obtain her Practical Nursing license. Interestingly, while gathering information, Susan shared with her case manager (CM) that she too was a Head Start child and had attended the Frostproof CDC as a child.

Susan was accepted into the LPN Program at South Florida State College, but there were no seats available. However, after receiving a call from the college on August 19, 2015 she learned that a seat had become available and she was on the list and on her way to a better life!

Susan then began her journey through the

nursing program with assistance along the way from ALPI. Assistance consisted of help with tuition, books, scrubs and medical supplies, along with gas cards to attend school and complete her clinical rotations and child care fees.

Its important to note that while Susan was enrolled in school, she continued to volunteer at Frostproof CDC. She believes that its important to give back to the community and to those that help others.

On July 28, 2016, Susan's case manager, Sheila Armstead, attended her graduation ceremony at South Florida State College in Sebring.

Susan is now employed as a contract nurse at Frostproof Child Development Center, where she still continues to volunteer her time.

#### CHILDREN & YOUTH DEVELOPMENT SUCCESS STORIES

#### Violence Reduction Partnership

The Violence Reduction Partnership is a collaborative effort between the United States Attorney's Office for the Southern District of Florida and federal, state, and local government agencies, as well as non-profit, faith-based and educational organizations to reduce gun and gang-related violence while enhancing public safety through the integration of evidence-based prevention, law enforcement, and ex-offender reentry initiatives. This specific partnership is between the Agricultural and Labor Program, Inc., Head Start and the United States Attorney's Office – Southern District of Florida.


The Violence Reduction Partnership Pre-K Reading Program is a key component of the prevention strategy. The Pre-K Reading Program's goal is to increase children's appetite for reading before they enter elementary school, thereby reducing their risk of early academic failure. Following every reading session, volunteers give the children books to take home. Since 2014, the program has given out more than 11,000 books.



The goals of the reading program are to instill in the students excitement for reading, provide mentorship, prevent academic failure and derail the school-to-prison pipeline. The reading program has expanded to 21 schools throughout the Southern District of Florida, including Miami-Dade, Broward, Palm Beach, and St. Lucie counties.

## FUNDING & COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES

#### 2016 Summer Feeding and Work Experience Program



The ALPI Child Development and Family Services Division THE ALPI continues to collaborate with the Polk County School Board 2016 SUMMER to provide services to the community of Frostproof, FL **FFFDING** through the Summer Feeding Enrichment Program. The **ENRICHMENT** Summer Feeding Enrichment Program provides needed **PROGRAM** services to the children of this economically challenged **SERVED 2,625** community over the summer break. The program was **MFALS** located at the ALPI owned Lakeview Community Center and provided breakfast and lunch to children in the community. The program provided meals to children between the ages of 1 and 18 years of age. Adequate supervision and fun educational age appropriate activities were coordinated by ALPI Child Development Services staff between meals and through-

out the day. Activities included sports, arts and crafts, and presentations from

Children received free haircuts by professional barbers.

#### FUNDING & COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES

- Chase Settlement Grant (CSG) was utilized to provide emergency services to 11 families consisting of 24 family members.
- The LIHEAP program contracted with 10 non-profit organizations for the delivery of services to clients and CSBG contracted with 7 non-profit organizations.

## JOBS & PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES

- Approved pay increase for all eligible employees.
- Introduced a new health initiatives program in order to engage employees in health awareness activities, etc.
- 100% of ALPI employees met their Professional Development Individualized Plan (PDIP) training hours and all employees received an annual evaluation. PDIP incentive was awarded to all eligible staff.

#### COMMUNITY RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES

- Continue to secure ongoing IT support to maintain an efficient and effective computer network system. Updated website by adding an interactive calendar, more inclusive archive page, added videos as well as other upgrades.
- Conducted and facilitated ongoing management and support staff meetings, training and technical assistance opportunities.
- Maintained safe and positive working environments, a positive cash flow and ongoing agency support funding for all programs and services.


